Hispanic's Celebrate Three Kings Day "Dia de los Tres Reyes Magos"

The Hispanic Tradition of celebrating the Three King's Day or El Dia De Los Tres Reyes Magos, dating back as early as the 16th century, is strongly rooted in their deep faith and religious traditions. It is celebrated twelve days after Christmas which falls on January 6th and is also referred to as "The Day of the Epiphany." As told in the 2nd chapter in the book of Mathew, the Three Kings Melchior, Gaspar, and Balthazar, visited Jesus after his birth bearing gifts of Gold, Frankincense, & Myrrh. They were following a star that foretold the coming of a king that would save the world.

It is a custom that, on January 5th, children prepare a box filled with hay as if for baby Jesus to lie in. The box is then placed under their beds and the children go to sleep. The morning of January 6th, the children wake up to find three gifts in their boxes; symbolic to the three gifts that were given to baby Jesus in the Manger.

Many Latin American countries and Hispanic communities all throughout America still cherish and continue this custom by passing it on to their children. This celebration teaches them the history and the practice of their faith. It is a way to help them stay focused on what the season really is about.

The birth of Jesus; brings us all together in celebrations and family get-togethers. It is celebrated thru community gatherings that feature the arrival of the Three Kings bearing gifts for the young ones, accompanied by traditional music and dishes that help keep the heritage alive in our community. It doesn't just end on Christmas Day, but it continues on for 12 more days and repeated for many years to come.
